We, the 69 undersigned organizations, join in commending the National Prevention Council for the release of *The National Prevention Strategy: America's Plan for Better Health and Wellness*. We share the Strategy's vision of "improving the health and quality of life for individuals, families, and communities by moving the nation from a focus on sickness and disease to one based on prevention and wellness," and we support the Strategy's overarching goal to "increase the number of Americans who are healthy at every stage of life."

Bringing 17 federal agencies together for the first time to prioritize prevention policies and programs can improve the health and quality of life for all Americans keeping us healthy in the first place, rather than treating people only after they become sick. Every part of our society, from transportation and housing to labor and defense can play an active role in promoting health for individuals, families and communities. We recognize the importance of advancing the NPS Strategic Directions including the creation of healthy and safe community environments, linking clinical and community preventive services, empowering people, and eliminating health disparities to ensure that all can share in the benefits of good health.

The American people are ready for this change, and support this goal. We know that preventing disease keeps our families healthy so that children can attend school ready to learn, adults can be more productive at work, seniors can retain independence. Research shows that the public overwhelmingly agrees that the prevention of illness has been neglected in our health care system and now must receive top priority. Prevention can lower healthcare costs, including those of employers.

Prevention is an investment in the future health of America. This new approach can have a positive impact on everyone's health, young and old. It is up to each individual to keep themselves and their families healthy, but, when implemented, the NPS will help support Americans in creating the opportunities to be as healthy as they can be.

The commitment to prevention reflected in this Strategy will help control health care costs and grow our economy; improve worker productivity; reduce health disparities among underserved populations; and save untold lives and suffering.

We all stand ready to work with the Surgeon General and the National Prevention Council to assure effective implementation of the National Prevention Strategy.
