#### **FY13 L-HHS Appropriations Priorities**

 Provide at least \$25.3 million for CDC's National Asthma Control Program (NACP), and maintain it as a distinct, stand-alone program.

It is estimated that more than 25 million Americans currently have asthma, of whom 7 million are children. The NACP tracks asthma prevalence, promotes asthma control and prevention and builds capacity in state programs. This program has been highly effective: the rate of asthma has increased, yet asthma mortality and morbidity rates have decreased. Recently, CDC issued data that showed that the prevalence of asthma is increasing in the United States, particularly among minority populations. Maintaining NACP will be critical to educating patients on asthma management and further reducing unnecessary asthma-related deaths as well as healthcare costs.

• Provide \$32 billion for the National Institutes of Health (NIH)

Research supported by NIH has been instrumental in the fight to identify the causes of and effective treatments for lung diseases. The American Lung Association supports increased funding for NIH research on the prevention, diagnosis, treatment and cures for tobacco use and all lung diseases including asthma, COPD, lung cancer and tuberculosis.

 Provide \$197.117 million for the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's Office of Smoking and Health (OSH)

The American Lung Association supports the President's FY13 budget request of \$197.117, which includes \$89 million from the Prevention and Public Health Fund. The Office of Smoking and Health at CDC is the lead federal agency for tobacco prevention and control. Smoking is the leading cause of preventable death in the United States and costs the U.S. almost \$200 billion in healthcare costs and lost productivity. As such, support for tobacco cessation and prevention activities is among the most effective and cost-effective investments in disease prevention.

 Preserve the Prevention and Public Health Fund as mandated by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act

The Prevention and Public Health Fund is crucial in financing proven and effective public health and wellness programs. Already the Prevention and Public Health Fund is helping to reduce tobacco use, the leading cause of preventable death in the United States. It is also assisting states in monitoring outbreaks of infectious diseases such as influenza, and is being used to prevent and treat diseases, including COPD, lung cancer and asthma. Eliminating the Fund would put critical public health programs in jeopardy leading to greater health care costs over time. The Lung Association supports fully funding the Prevention and Public Health Fund and strongly opposes any further cuts to the Fund.

### Support and Defend EPA's Programs to Address Climate Change and Improve Air Quality

The American Lung Association urges the Committee to help ensure that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has the necessary resources to protect the public from the health threats of air pollution, and to defend the Clean Air Act as a key public health safeguard, especially for populations most at risk, including those with asthma and other lung diseases, children, older adults, and people with heart disease and diabetes—from the dangers of airborne pollutants, including the threats from growing carbon dioxide pollution.

At a minimum, the American Lung Association urges the Committee to provide the President's FY13 budget request of \$1,124,581 million for U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) programs to address climate change and improve air quality, and we call your attention to few specific programs below. In addition to these specific requests, we urge Congress to reject any effort to delay or weaken EPA authority to address air pollution.

- Provide \$101.9 million for the EPA Federal Vehicle Fuels Standards and Certifications Programs
  It is critically important to increase the budget for EPA's Federal Vehicle Fuels Standards and
  Certifications Programs, particularly to improve the effectiveness of the certification and compliance
  testing programs in the face of increasing demand, more challenging oversight requirements, and
  the increasing diversity of technologies. Currently, EPA conducts very limited testing of small
  imported engines but a high fraction of these engines fail the test. Additional resources are needed
  to improve testing and compliance for this important program to protect public health.
- Restore to \$30 million for the Diesel Emissions Reductions Program
   The American Lung Association opposes cuts in the President's Budget to the widely supported diesel emission reduction (DERA) program. Twenty million old diesel engines are in use today that pollute communities and threaten workers. Immense opportunities remain to reduce diesel emissions through the DERA program. Please restore funding to a minimum \$30 million level enacted in FY 2012.
- Restore the EPA Radon Programs and State Indoor Radon Grants

The President's budget proposes to eliminate all funding (\$8 million in FY 2012) for the State Indoor Radon Grants, the only nationwide program that helps prevent the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States: Radon. States and tribes depend on this program as well as technical assistance through the Radon Programs (which was cut by \$2 million from FY 2012 levels), to educate the public and fight this deadly carcinogen. EPA warns that it may not meet the 2015 goal of preventing 1,460 premature lung cancer deaths annually due to the budget cuts. We therefore urge the Committee to fully restore the EPA radon programs to FY 2012 levels.
